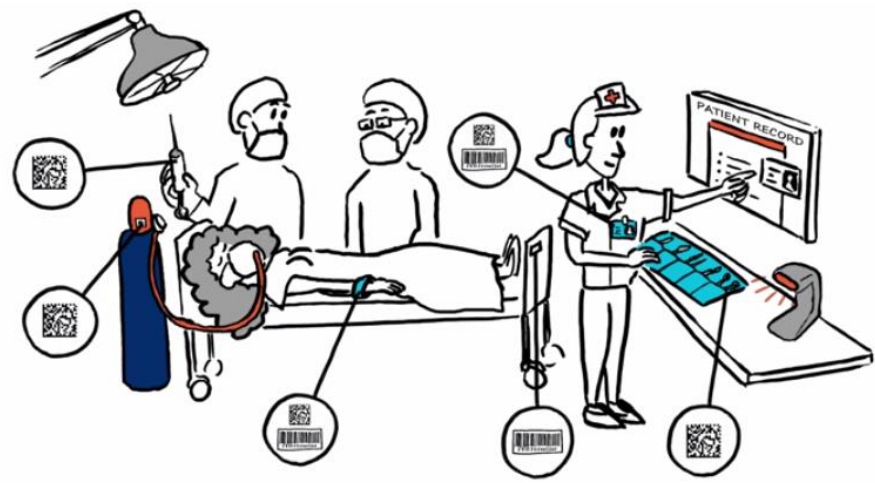

The importance of UDI for Irish healthcare



GS1 Standards in action

- Ability to recall
- Patient level costing
- Inventory management

Key Drivers:

Regulatory Compliance

- All Suppliers required to be UDI compliant

EU regulation will also require healthcare providers to **capture and store the UDI** for Class III Implantable devices ...preferably electronically!

Patient Safety

- UDI will be included in Recall and field safety notices

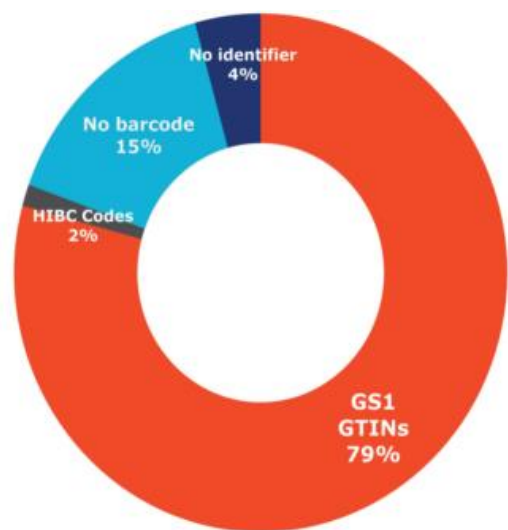

- 79% of All products in the NDC have a GS1 Barcode/**GTIN**
- **GS1 GTIN** now requested in tender documents
- GS1 UDI being used to **track medical equipment assets & Instrument trays and Endoscopes** in the HSE
